#### The 1950s Park Forest House Museum is in Its New Home!

#### View of the new 1950s Park Forest **House Museum**



The 1950s Park Forest House Museum, now located in St. Mary's Catholic Church, 227 Monee Road, is settled in its new home. The Society has not yet reestablished regular open hours, but the museum can be shown by appointment, if a volunteer is available. Those wishing to see the museum by appointment should contact us via email, or should call Jane Nicoll, Museum Director, at 708-481-4252; or Michael Gans, at 708-305-3308.

Target hours will be Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, 1-3:30 p.m. We are not open for a regular schedule yet because we need more people to help! Anyone interested in being trained to be a

volunteer museum guide or docent should also call Jane or Mike.

The museum now represents a home in the first five years the village was settled, 1948-1953. Although no longer in an original rental unit, the layout is very similar, and it looks like a home furnished as it might have been in those first years.

Andrew Brown, our former landlord at Central Park Apartments, generously allowed us to take the kitchen cupboards, which his staff carefully removed. Superior Cabinet and Window employees, Al Jones and Tom Grant, with permission of owner, Frank Klauck, built us a rolling platform on which they mounted the upper and lower cabinets. It looks great and very authentic. Thanks to all the owners and staff involved!!

Many people helped pack the museum carefully before the move. Museum Director, Jane Nicoll,

worked on the layout, which required measuring all of the pieces and arranging them on a gird until most of the collection could be fit into the two rooms. She used a few volunteers to help unpack some of the collection. Jane put in many hours beyond her work as Society Archivist setting the museum back up. Volunteers Carl Stover and Bill Wilkinson built Bedroom and Living Room closets and a wall divider for display material. Mike Wiater of Crete donated a standing kitchen pantry which replaced the built-in pantry we had in the original rental townhome.

The move took place on May 19, 2015. It took until late-July for everything to be in place. The bathroom sink and medicine cabinet (originals from

141 Forest Blvd) still need a wall built to support them for the bathroom display to be complete.

Now we need a Volunteer Coordinator or Scheduler and more volunteers before we can get fully up and running again. We have been open a few sporadic times since August 1, and we are working on some tours by appointment.

One advantage of the museum being in St. Mary's is that it is now accessible.

We hope this means that more senior citizen groups and nursing home visitors can enjoy the Nostalgic trip down Memory Lane that the museum provides. We do need to set up appointments for such visits.

Spread the word to neighbors, friends and family that the museum is ready to be shown, and that we need volunteers!! Volunteer yourself!! It takes a village to support a museum!

By September 30, I have to complete the Final Performance Report for the National Endowment for the Humanities Preservation Assistance Grant which paid for a Conservation Consultant and much needed clean acid-free cartons, along with many other preservation supplies.

"Step Back Into a 1950s Halloween" exhibit, September 12-November 7, 2015 would be a fun way to get a good look at the new museum. Hopefully, volunteers fill our remaining shifts and we can advertise regular hours!

This week, we received word that the Village of Park Forest has awarded us a Fourth Matching Challenge Grant of \$5,000! Your memberships, annual fund donations, and purchases from the museum and online store all go to the match. Thank you to Village Manager Tom Mick, Mayor Ostenburg and the Park Forest Village Board of Trustees for your support!

# The Historical Society bids "Bon Voyage" to two Former Board Members and three Dedicated Volunteers

In August Jim and Helen Sylvia moved to San Antonio, Texas.

Helen had served as a docent at the museum, along with her many musical volunteer tasks in the Village and the area.

Jim had been Society Treasurer for several years. He also inspected the House Museum twice a week since 2007. When the Society moved the Archive into St. Mary' Catholic Church, Jim helped with the move, then led the volunteers in setting up several sections of industrial shelving—doing a great deal of that himself.

Since January 2012, he also checked in at the Archive on a biweekly basis. He was an immense help to the Archivist in setting up payment plans and working on the budgets for the two federal grants we have been administering for the past two years.

Jim was also very involved in St. Irenaeus, PADS, South Suburban Food Co-op, and drove many friends for doctor appointments. Jim and Helen will be missed in our community.

Committee. That involvement evolved into becoming a Board Member of the Park Forest Historical Society for many years, where she served as Secretary for some time. In 2002, Suzie undertook oral histories of Park Forest World War II veterans, a project called, "GI Stories from a GI Town." For seven years, she put together the PFHS November program with selected veterans and their wives telling parts of the stories from their oral histories. Suzie eventually recorded 92 oral histories and transcribed 57 of them herself.

During the 50th Anniversary of Park Forest, Suzie created a Park Forest History Packet which we sent to all of the schools

educating Park Forest students. Along with Jean Bernstein and May Wiza, Suzie created a Park Forest History Curriculum on CDROM and marketed it to all schools serving Park Forest students. Suzie began each fall to contact the school districts and to set up when the unit would be taught. As school funding waned, she began teaching the curriculum herself in Districts 162 and 163 to fourth and fifth graders. Anne Marie Leofanti has agreed to continue this effort for the Society.

Suzie also served monthly as a docent at the 1950s Park Forest House Museum. She was a volunteer at Respond Now and a dedicated member of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Park Forest.. She is moving to Eugene, Oregon to live near her daughter and grandson.

The Museum moved to St. Mary's Catholic Church, 227 Monee Road in May 2015. It took until late July to be fully settled. We do not have regular open hours, yet, while we rebuild our volunteer group. We will be open fewer hours, and by appointment. We hope to get more tours because we are now accessible (all on one floor). We need volunteers!

Please read our newsletters and program fliers online at <u>parkforesthistory.org</u>. We are working hard on two federal grants--one from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, and a Preservation Assistance Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Official work on these ends September 30, but we will keep working on what was started with the grants!! A new volunteer plans to take Park Forest History curriculum into the schools each spring. The museum is ready to be shown, but **we have to advertise as being open by appointment due to a lack of active volunteers.** (We are having some success in scheduling some Wednesday and Saturday open hours, but have not covered all, yet.) We are promoting the museum on Social Media and want those doors open!

#### Who we are:

The Park Forest Historical Society was founded in 1985, and became an independent 501 (c) (3) corporation in 1989. Its mission was to support the Local History Collection and Archive of the Park Forest Public Library, which had been started by the Reference Staff in 1981. In 1998, the Society helped form the 50th **Anniversary House Museum at 397 Forest** Blvd. In January 2007, the Archive was moved to remote storage by the library. In the same month, the museum changed its name to 1950s Park Forest House Museum. In May 2007, the museum at 395-397 Forest Blvd lost its lease and was put into storage. In October 2007, Central Park Townhomes and AIMCO offered the museum a unit at 141 Forest Blvd, allowing the Society to pull the basic house museum out of storage. As of May 2015, the museum is at St. Mary's Catholic Church. In January 2012, the Archive and our office moved into St. Mary's, 227 Monee Road. Much of the Local History Collection is available in the adult services area of the Park Forest Public Library. The Society has the photograph collection. At present, the Society is seeking a permanent home for the museum, the archival collection, office and the digital computer lab.
