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Our 1950s Museum Needs a New Home

Once again, the Park Forest Historical Society Board is looking for a new home for the 15year-old 1950s Park Forest House Museum. Our landlord, Andrew Brown, co-owner of Central Park Apartments let us know two years ago that, if we stayed in the 141 Forest Blvd unit past May 31, 2014, we would have to pay the full rent, which is now well over \$1000. We simply cannot pay that amount. In fact, Mr. Brown and his partner would prefer we would not stay. We had hoped to find a space in one of the co-operatives. Unfortunately all of the co-operatives have covenants which prevent anyone but an individual or family entering into a co-operative agreement.

The Board had counted too heavily on this solution and now finds itself with no place to move the museum when the lease ends on May 31, 2014. As one of my local history friends asks,

See Page 2 for more details "In such a historic community, why is it so hard to preserve its history?" In truth it has been an uphill battle to preserve Park Forest history, and now we are asking for help. We are a small board with limited time to research options.

We are asking members of the community to help us. Do you own an empty house in good condition in the village, or know someone who does? The Society is not in a financial position to pay much rent. We hope there is someone with an empty house who would donate the building to our use for the house museum. We are also considering finding a building where we could simply have a Park Forest museum.

Museum Director, Jane Nicoll says, "If we can not be in an original rental unit, we must sacrifice our goal of preserving a unit in almost original condition. This is a big disappointment to us, and an architectural loss in this historic village. We will still preserve original architectural elements, in hopes that someday we will be able to return to a rental unit and preserve it." If we are unable to find anyplace, we will face the decision to liquidate the museum, or to put it into storage again. If there is no museum open, we will lose the remainder of the \$22,700 in funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services Grant, which was awarded in September 2013, because it is a museum-based grant.

The Board is open to suggestions and seeking volunteers willing to help us with relocation options. Society President, Michael Gans says, "It will take a Village to save and move the museum this time. The Board has worked over the past seven years to save the Archival Collection, finding a place to house it in January 2012. In 2007, we saved two units of the museum, found the new home for it at 141 Forest Blvd, and financed it alone. This time it will take the help of others who care about Park Forest history to find a new location and make the move possible. We hope concerned citizens will step up to the challenge."

Take a Trip on the South Shore via Our February Program

Be sure to join us for a very special program, Sunday, February 23, 2:30 p.m. at Village Hall. Cynthia Ogorek will give a program on her latest book, <u>Along the Chicago South Shore & South</u> <u>Bend Rail Line.</u>

Cynthia Ogorek is a public historian and author based in Calumet City, IL. Specializing in Calumet Region history, she has produced a series of three books on the region's transportation history. Her other books are <u>Along the Calumet River</u> (Arcadia 2004) and <u>The Lincoln Highway</u> <u>Around Chicago</u> (Arcadia 2008).

Starting in 1901 as a three-mile-long trolley line in East Chicago, Indiana, the Chicago South Shore and South Bend Railroad expanded in 1908 to connect South Bend, Indiana, with Chicago, Illinois. Once a treasure in the Sam Insull utilities empire, today it is the only functioning electric interurban in the United States.

Cynthia says the "secret" subtitle for the book is "The non-railfan's guide to the South Shore—a history of the railroad for 'the rest of us." During her presentation on the South Shore railroad, Cynthia will give an overview of the history of the company plus notes on how an electric interurban works and the historic sites you can see from the windows of the "South Shore" as it travels the ninety miles between downtown Chicago and the South Bend airport. Images of rolling stock, passenger depots, excursion destinations, and historic sites along the way combine to reveal the century-long story of the railroad and its 90-mile corridor.

Shortly after its publication, the book won awards from the Illinois State Historical Society, the Illinois Women's Press Association and the National Federation of Press Women.

From a world-class city through rolling agricultural acres, from steel mills through a national lakeshore, some 200 vintage photographs illustrate the unique view of the Calumet region that South Shore passengers have traditionally enjoyed.

Ms. Ogorek is a knowledgeable and engaging speaker. She will be selling and signing copies of all her books at the program. Price of this book is \$24 plus tax. Find out more about Cynthia at www.centerofknownhistory.com

National Endowment for the Humanities **Preservation Assistance Grant** for Collection Preservation

We have received another federal grant. The National Endowment for the Humanities



been awarded

to us in the amount of \$6000. This grant will enable us to hire a conservation consultant who will come for two days to evaluate the archival collection at the Archive Office at St. Mary's Catholic Church, 227 Monee Road. The consultant will produce a report evaluating the environment, collection condition and policies. After she makes her assessment, she is expected to advise on and approve the purchase of supplies to house the archival collection materials and further preserve them.

The assessments produced in this grant can be used as support to apply for further grants to preserve the collection.

If our weather allows, the consultant, Jennifer Hain Teper from the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign will evaluate the collection on February 20-21. Archivist, Jane Nicoll hopes to have the supplies purchased soon after that, so collections can be rehoused in clean folders and boxes as the collections are processed for the IMLS grant.
